#### **BLOOMBERG NEWS**

Honda Motor Co., Harley-Davidson Inc. and other motorcycle makers must cut tailpipe exhaust by 60 percent starting in 2006, U.S. regulators said in the first such change since 1978. The rules require "highway" bikes, such as Honda's Gold Wing, Harley's Fat Boy, scooters and mopeds, to emit less smog-forming hydrocarbons and nitrogen oxides, the Environmental Protection Agency said Tuesday. "This ... harmonizes

national guidelines with those of California, which has regulated motorcycle pollution," said EPA spokesman John Millett. After 2007, the EPA will require fuel hoses and tanks that curb pollution from gasoline evaporation, the agency said. The EPA estimates the cost of new catalytic converters and emissions controls will be about \$75 per motorcycle by 2010, in the final phase of the new rules.

#### **AMA NEWS**

AMA OUTRAGED OVER MANDATORY MOTOR-CYCLIST ORGAN-DONOR BILL

The American Motorcyclist Association has expressed its outrage over a proposed law in California that could force some motorcyclists to be organ donors against their wishes.

The proposal is an amendment to Assembly Bill 1200. The original proposal would allow adults 18 and older to decide whether to wear a helmet when riding a motorcycle. The amended version states that those who chose not to wear a helmet "is deemed to have consented to the making of an anatomical gift under this act."

AMA Western States Representative Nick Haris said that while the AMA supported the bill in its original form, it can't support the measure with the new amendment.

"Riders who wish to donate their organs should be under no undue pressure to do so," Haris said. "This provision makes a mockery of the spirit and kindness of voluntary organ donation."

Assemblyman John Longville (D-San Bernardino) amended the bill to require motorcyclists who wish to ride without a helmet to be organ donors. A New Mexico lawmaker introduced similar legislation last year and quickly withdrew the proposal after the AMA mustered opposition to the bill from motorcyclists around the nation.

#### Our Daily Bread January 8th, 2004 OUR HOME IS AHEAD

#### Hebrews 11

"8By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. 9By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. <sup>10</sup>For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God."

Abraham first described himself as "a foreigner and a visitor" when he was buying a burial plot for Sarah (Genesis 23:4). Time and death makes you think about such things.

Most elderly believers say the same thing: There's no home for us this side of heaven. 




#### SAFETY AND EDUCATION by Lenny Pletsch

- Black Ice sneaks up on a driver. Most of the time, motorist don't know they are on black ice until they begin to slip and slide—which is usually caused by traveling to fast for icy conditions. Check the weather reports before heading out and drive according to the conditions (which means "slow Down").
- Be aware that your snow plows drivers may not be able to see you due to blind spots or poor visibility. Give them room to work on the roads and parking lots. Don't follow to closely or pull out in front of them. It is always a good safety policy to "yield" to the snow plows.
- · Walking from the vehicle to the building also de-

mands extra safety precautions including: (1) appropriate footwear for navigating through snow and ice, (2) using a slower, more deliberate pace.

• Choose parking lots and pathways that have been plowed or sanded (even if they are not the regular route or are slightly further than the regular route.)

If you do this just be sure to tell them you want a "Type 7" endorsement. A Type 7 endorsement allows you to operate two and three wheeled motorcycles. # FREEDOM JUST LIKE RED WHITE AND BLUE!

#### NCOM Sacramento Ca. 1-10 to 1-12, 2004

My name is Leanne Horn and I'm a new member with ABATE of Washington. This week I had the wonderful opportunity to go to Sacramento to attend the NCOM Regional Seminar and Meeting. It was quite the experience! There were several topics that were address at the conference that I would like to share with you.

At the onset, I attended the ABATE of California Board of Directors (B.O.D.) meeting on January 10th. Like every meeting at B.O.D., they started by taking roll call. Unfortunately, the number of ABATE chapters in attendance was relatively low. It seems that ABATE of California is experiencing the same apathy among members that Washington State is struggling with. They also have been experiencing difficulty in recruiting other bikers, i.e. Gold wingers, sport biker riders etc, to join ABATE to help fight for their freedoms. In general, there is widespread apathy among the motorcycle community. However, it is ABATE of California goal to increase its membership to 50,000 bikers in the next five years. Currently their membership roster only includes about 4,000 members at this time. It is the ABATE of California intention on recruiting a sizable membership to help increase the numbers and presence at their state capital. I wish them all the best in their endeavors.

Next, the ABATE of California open the floor to their guest that attended the meeting. ABATE of Washington made a very strong showing despite the horrible weather conditions!!! ABATE of Oregon was also there at the meeting. Way to go!!! Both Washington and Oregon ABATE really made an impression on the ABATE of California members. It was nice to see several committed members attend NCOM.

During the meeting, I was updated on the legislative issues that ABATE of California was dealing with. Like us, they are struggling with the helmet repeal legislation. Their legislators feel that the helmet repeal would be deemed a financial burden on the community if motorcyclists were injured or killed. California legislators seem to be of the same opinion as our legislators. ABATE of California is still running a clean bill on their helmet repeal but they do have an insurance amendment available if the bill does not pass on the clean bill legislation. The insurance amendment will only be used as a last ditch effort. On January 12, ABATE of California clean helmet bill will go before the committee for a vote. I hope they are successful in their efforts.

Another issue that California is dealing with is the new EPA legislation and standards on motorcycles. EPA has issued new emission standard for motorcycle manu-

facturers. However, the larger motorcycle manufacturers are able to buy "points" against these standards in order to make more motorcycles that would not meet these standards. As you can imagine, this legislation would have crippled smaller manufacturers since they do not have the means of purchasing "points" like the larger corporations (This is just a general idea. Please do not take this verbatim). ABATE of California was instrumental in reversing this legislation for the small bike manufacturers! ABATE of California was able to get small bike manufacturers, i.e. businesses that make 2,500 motorcycles or less, completely exempt from this law! Wow!! Am impressive success story for ABATE of California.

Probably the biggest and hottest legislative issue on their plate is the Patriot Act. As you may already know, the Patriot Act is the biggest threat to our civil liberties and rights. NCOM has produced three pamphlets of information about this matter. It is my hope to have copies of these pamphlets available to chapter reps at the upcoming B.O.D. meeting on January 17th. If you are unable to attend the meeting, I will try to figure out a way to have the material sent to you. ABATE of California, NCOM, and the Confederation of Club (C.O.C.) had several ideas on how to combat future legislation on the upcoming Patriot Act II. Several individuals strongly encourage people to write, not email or fax, their U.S. Representatives and Senator about your opposition to Patriot Act II. Another suggestion is that ABATE should team up with other groups, such as PETA, Right to Life, ACLU etc, that are listed as potential "terrorists" and lobby against the Patriot Act II in Congress. Some people suggested that we hire a lawyer to take on the Patriot Act II in the Supreme Court. Unfortunately, it would require at least 250K just to retain a lawyer for this cause. Some recommended that we take up a nationwide collection to help pay for the lawyers' cost to take on the Patriot Act. Others suggested that ABATE members go out into their community and start educating voters about the Patriot Act. These are all great ideas. I feel we can accomplish this goal even if we need to form alliances with other groups that are different from ours. The point is that we need to stick together on this issue whether we are bikers, working professionals, homemakers, religious patrons etc. Lets face it, ABATE and other organizations will have to help one another with their fight against the Patriot Act. I would like to encourage each of you to pick up a copy the NCOM's Patriot Act pamphlets when you can. The truth will scare you. There were other topics

discussed at the conference. One of these topics was motorcycle training and education. Currently, ABATE of California offers motorcycle training and education classes for a fee to those individuals that want to learn how to ride. A motorcycle driver's Ed!!! This program generates revenue for ABATE of California so they, in turn, can afford a lobbyist in their state Congress or whatever they may need! I believe that Washington State motorcycle training and education course are solely offered by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (someone correct me if I'm wrong). This may be an opportunity to capitalize on this potential market! It was suggested that grant money or federal money could be used to start up this potential revenue option. Now granted, this may be a bit touchy to ask the government for money since we are under great scrutiny of the Patriot Act. However, it might be something to look into. This type of program would give ABATE of Washington the exposure they need to possibly recruit new members and to educate people about motorcycles. Just a thought!


There were some good suggestions on how to get PR without spending money. One idea was to write letters to editors of newspapers and biker magazines and signed them with you name and the name of the organization that you belong to. Another suggestion was to include photos of new members of your chapters in your chapter publications or state newsletters. Another recommendation was to assign a representative to appear on radio talk shows and discuss your issues and concerns. The list goes on. Perhaps, these ideas may benefit us in the future.

There were a few meetings that I was not able to attend due to flight schedules. I regret that I do not have any additional information to report about the C.O.C. meeting. I have heard that their meeting was very informative.

Overall, I believe the NCOM conference was a success and an inspiration. I know now that we are not alone in our fight for our freedoms and rights. I also know that we have a wealth of resources at our hands if we are able to manage and use them effectively. Everyday, we have won or lost battles but we have all gained something in the process, whether it is freedom, knowledge or peace of mind. I hope my information will encourage all to participate more in ABATE and take up on its cause especially against the Patriot Act. Remember, freedom is not given, it is earned. If we give into the Patriot Act, freedom will be nothing more than a distant memory.



## HOWABILL BECOMES A LAW



A bill may be introduced in either the Senate or House of Representatives.

A committee studies the bill and often holds public hearings on it.



A committee report is read in open session of the House or Senate, and the bill is then referred to the Rules Committee.



The Rules Committee can either place the bill on the second reading of the calendar for debate before the entire body, or take no action.

At the second reading a bill is subject to debate and amendment before being placed on the third reading calendar for final passage.

After passing one house, the bill goes through the same procedure in the other house.



When the bill is accepted in both houses, it is signed by the respective leaders and sent to the Governor.



The Governor signs the bill into law or may veto all or part of it. If the Governor fails to act on the bill, it may become law without a signature.

"While you're in there, you might as well get my hat too."


As the bikers walk in, All the children do grin. Emotions are mixed as we all come together, Some children are gone, some are a lot better.

#### THE MILITARY PERSON

The average age of the military man is 19 years. He is a short haired, tight-muscled kid who, under normal circumstances is considered by society as half man, half boy. He can march until he is told to stop or stop until he is told to march.

He obeys orders instantly and without hesitation, but he is not without spirit or individual dignity. He is self-sufficient. He has two sets of fatigues: he washes one and wears the other. He keeps his canteens full and his feet dry. He sometimes forgets to brush his teeth, but never to clean his rifle. He can cook his own meals, mend his own clothes, and fix his own hurts. If you're thirsty, he'll share his water with you; if you are hungry, his food. He'll even split his ammunition with you in the midst of battle when you run low.

He has learned to use his hands like weapons and weapons like they were his hands. He can save your life - or take it, because that is his job. He will often do twice the work of a civilian, draw half the pay and still find ironic humor in it all. He has seen more suffering and death then he should have in his short lifetime.

He has stood atop mountains of dead bodies, and helped to create them. He has wept in public and in private, for friends who have fallen in combat and is unashamed. He feels every note of the National Anthem vibrate through his body while at rigid attention, while tempering the burning desire to 'square-away' those around him who haven't bothered to stand, remove their hat, or even stop talking. In an odd twist, day in and day out, far from home, he defends their right to be disrespectful.

Just as did his Father, Grandfather, and Great-grandfather, he is paying the price for our freedom. Beardless or not, he is not a boy. He is the American Fighting Man that has kept this country free for over 200 years.

He has asked nothing in return, except our friendship and understanding. Remember him, always, for he has earned our respect and admiration with his blood. And now we even have woman over there in danger, doing their part in this tradition of going to War when our nation calls us to do so. As you go to bed tonight, remember this shot.. A short lull, a little shade and a picture of loved ones in their helmets.




